As a member of the University of Maryland Medical System, the state's largest health system, we not only deliver advanced care locally, but also provide access to expanded clinical services and academic medicine.

## **CLINICAL EXCELLENCE**

- UM UCH includes two acute care, not-for-profit hospitals UM Upper Chesapeake Medical Center in Bel Air and UM Harford Memorial Hospital in Havre de Grace — as well as a health and wellness campus in Aberdeen that fully opens in 2024.
- UM UCH provides access to the county's largest network of primary and preventive care providers, serving over 36,000 patients across seven practices, as well as convenient urgent care locations spanning the entire county in Aberdeen, Abingdon, Fallston and Forest Hill.
- Ten years after opening, the Kaufman Cancer Center continues to offer individuals facing cancer the best possible care right here in our community. Our affiliation with the UM Marlene and Stewart Greenebaum Comprehensive Cancer Center means access to leading technologies and clinical trials with highly trained experts on site providing the most advanced—and uniquely personalized—cancer care for every patient.
- The Klein Family Center was voted as having the "best addictions counseling" in the 2022 Best of Harford list by Harford Magazine. The Center helps people overcome the challenges of all types of mental health conditions, including substance abuse, regardless of insurance and ability to pay. Harford County's behavioral health hub since 2019, It provides urgent care, outpatient therapy and residential stabilization care, serving both adults and children.
- The innovative Comprehensive CARE Center is an outpatient transitional health center that serves as a bridge between the hospital and community. It is dedicated to helping patients navigate the right care in the right setting.
- With a strong commitment to virtual outpatient visits and remote monitoring, UM UCH has over 16,000 virtual health visits per year across its primary care and ambulatory providers.
- Both hospitals are designated as Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services Systems (MIEMSS) Primary Stroke Centers, which means they are extremely well equipped to treat people with symptoms of stroke and provide specialized acute care.
- University of Maryland School of Medicine faculty physicians across 21 specialties bring their expertise to UM Upper Chesapeake Health to provide care locally. These specialty services range from breast to spine surgery and GYN oncology to pediatric endocrinology.

#### A BETTER STATE OF CARE

Healthcare is evolving. UM Upper Chesapeake Health is actively transitioning care delivery from the hospital setting to the community setting. More specifically, it is bringing to its community a medical center, ambulatory surgery center, and an acute care bed tower.

The health and wellness campus in Aberdeen will improve health care by increasing access to services and improving coordination efforts between hospital-based and community care providers. It features a modern medical center with emergency and inpatient services, a variety of community specialty care, and a behavioral health pavilion.

Prior to the opening of the medical center in Aberdeen, the Bel Air bed tower and the ambulatory surgery center will open. The bed tower consists of 72 additional patient beds to the existing Kaufman Cancer Center and the ambulatory surgery center, also on the Bel Air campus, will feature an orthopedic, hand and spine specialty practice.

After 112 years of service to the community, UM Harford Memorial Hospital will close its doors in spring 2024.
